

LICENSE AGREEMENT FOR THE ONE HUNDRED CLUB

The City of Portsmouth (hereinafter "City"), a municipal corporation with a principal place of business of 1 Junkins Avenue, Portsmouth, New Hampshire 03801, for good and valuable consideration as set forth herein, hereby grants this non-exclusive, revocable license to The One Hundred Club with a principal place of business at 100 Market Street, Portsmouth, NH 03801 (hereinafter "Licensee") pursuant to the following terms and conditions:

- 1. <u>Area of License:</u> The City authorizes Licensee to use the loading zone on Hanover Street as shown on the attached Exhibit 1.
- 2. <u>Use:</u> Licensee may make use of the Licensed Area for the purpose of Licensee's parking valet service activities. Such activities are subject to the following conditions:
 - The hours of operation of the valet service are 5:00 p.m. to 12:00 a.m. Monday through Sunday.
 - No vehicles receiving valet services may be parked in municipal spaces (metered, garage or otherwise).
 - There shall be no stacking of vehicles in adjacent parking spaces.
 - This license is non-exclusive and the loading zone will remain available for commercial loading purposes and for such additional purposes as the City may authorize or license.
 - Licensee will represent clearly and consistently that it is a private company and that the municipality is not responsible for any damage or loss to vehicles or property.
- 3. <u>Signage:</u> This License Agreement also authorizes Licensee's use of the existing signage in place on Hanover Street as shown in Exhibit 1.
- 4. <u>Term:</u> This license shall commence upon the execution of this Agreement and terminate on June 30, 2023. This License may be renewed for an additional term upon the joint approval of the Parking and Traffic Safety Committee and the City Manager.
- 5. Payment Terms: Licensee will make payment of an annual fee to the City in the amount of \$_____ which represents the cost of the valet parking permit fee. No other payment is required. Payment is due upon the execution of this Agreement and shall be made to the City of

Portsmouth and directed to the City Parking Clerk at 1 Junkins Avenue, Portsmouth, NH. Failure to make the required payment when due may result in the termination of this Agreement at the City's option.

- 6. <u>Indemnification:</u> Licensee agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the City of Portsmouth for any and all property damage, bodily injury or personal injury which arises as a result of its use of the Licensed Area. This obligation survives termination or revocation of this Agreement.
- 7. Insurance: At all times during the use and exercise of this license, Licensee agrees to maintain comprehensive general liability insurance covering its operation under this license in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 general aggregate. Such insurance shall name the City of Portsmouth as an additional insured. Licensee agrees to maintain Garage Keepers insurance in the amount of \$100,000 per occurrence for the term of this Agreement. Certificates indicating the existence of these insurances shall be maintained on file at all times during the license period with the Parking and Transportation Division of the City of Portsmouth Public Works Department.
- 8. <u>Maintenance of Area:</u> Licensee will maintain the Licensed Area in neat and orderly fashion during Licensee's hours of use. The Licensee shall take such measures as may be necessary to maintain pedestrian and vehicular safety during use of the Licensed Areas for its valet service.
- 9. <u>Damage:</u> Licensee agrees to take reasonable steps to remedy promptly any damage to the Licensed Area caused by the Licensee's activities. The City may elect to accept reasonable reimbursement from the Licensee in lieu of remedy.
- 10. <u>Compliance With Other Laws:</u> This Agreement does not relieve Licensee from compliance with any other local, state or federal laws or regulations or conditions imposed by any local board. Failure to abide by any local, state or federal laws or regulations may, at the City's discretion, result in revocation.
- 11. Revocation: The City may terminate this Agreement or any provision contained in this Agreement on 72 hours written notice provided to Licensee if the public interest requires such termination, in which case all fees paid by Licensee shall be returned on a pro-rata basis. This Agreement may be revoked or suspended immediately without notice by the City for cause, e.g. violation of the terms of this license, in which case, all fees paid by Licensee shall remain the property of the City.



To Members of P&TS:

I am formally requesting that a discussion be scheduled on the May agenda, including Police and Fire input, as to why Washington Street between Court and State, should remain a two-way street.

Basically, could staff explain how a two-way street, which is impossibly a two-way street, safely be a two-way street?

I previously spoke at the March P&TS meeting describing regular encounters with oncoming traffic turning from State onto Washington when I am coming up Washington. I may be the only one verbalizing the issue, but I've witnessed other drivers who have encountered the same situation.

This past week there was a large truck coming down Washington St from State St. I didn't even attempt to turn onto Washington and was grateful not to.

This is not safe. That's the point. Either a vehicle has to back down Washington beyond the parked cars, or the vehicle on State has to back up. That's assuming there are no other vehicles in line.

This stretch of Washington St. is in a well-travelled area of our downtown. It empties onto a major road leading to Maine.

Driving could be much safer by making Washington one way to State, and Atkinson one way from State. It's not as though there isn't an option.

I am NOT asking or suggesting that the parking be eliminated along Washington St.

Could someone please address why this isn't feasible if it is not? I will then leave you at peace.

Please share with all P&TS members, and include in your packet.





Recommendations

The speed limit working group has come up with several recommendations for the parking and traffic safety committee to consider

Lower Neighborhood Connector Target Speed to 25



Current Complete Streets Design Guidelines indicate a 30 MPH target speed on Neighborhood Connector roads

Some Neighborhood Connector roads include South Street, Miller Avenue, McKinley Road, Harding Road and Kearsarge Way

The working group recommends lowering this target speed to 25 MPH

Lower Neighborhood Connector Target Speed to 25

Neighborhood connector streets with limits higher than 25 include:

- Islington Street (Spinney Road to Maplewood Avenue) Posted at 30
- Parrott Avenue

No Limit Posted, Defaults to 30 These streets are not listed with a speed limit in the Chapter 7 Ordinance, as thus have defaulted to 30 MPH limits

Recommend that these streets be lowered by ordinance to 25 MPH

City Staff has data supporting these streets to be lowered to 25 MPH under current New Hampshire State Law

Middle Road 2022 Trial

-Re-install 2021 temporary traffic calming measures

-Lower speed limit to 25 MPH


-Install RRFB at Riverbrook Condos crosswalk




Concepts for Committee to Consider

Concepts that will be brought back at a future meeting if desired

Downtown Advisory Speed Zone

The creation of a geographical downtown speed / pedestrian zone with a <u>target</u> speed of 20 MPH



Would necessitate a 20 MPH warning/advisory sign, as the lowest limit allowed under current NH Statute is 25 MPH



Advance Crosswalk Stencil / Decal

Design and installation of a stencil / sticker reminding pedestrians to be alert as they enter crosswalks located within the downtown advisory speed zone



Neighborhood Gateway Signage

- -Develop a standard Portsmouth sign for key neighborhood entry points
- -Not equivalent to larger municipal entry signs



- Name of neighborhood being entered (i.e. Elywn Park Neighborhood, Frank Jones Farm Neighborhood)
- Posted Speed Limit
- -Reminder to respect speed limit or other matters







Summary of Recommendations to the Committee

- Lower complete streets design guidelines target speeds for neighborhood connector streets from 30 MPH to 25 MPH
- Ordinance change to lower affected streets to 25 MPH
- Re-implement temporary traffic calming measures on Middle Road with a 25 MPH limit and monitor speeds; RRFB at Riverbrook condos; long term improvements for the corridor




Proposed Crosswalk and RRFB at Entry to Rail Trail just west of Islington St. and Vine St.

Good morning All,

My name is Bob Lenahan and I am a business owner on State Street here in Portsmouth. I have been at this current location since 2007. I am inquiring about an illuminated cross walk signal for the crosswalk on State Street. The location is from the African burial ground side of the street towards the Music Hall. I have told the Portsmouth Police that the speed limit is broken on a daily basis. The current signage for the crosswalk is an arrow and standard crosswalk sign. This does no one any good. I have been outside and yelled at the drivers (Most looking at cellphones) who speed through the crosswalk with total disregard for anyone who is standing at the crosswalk edge. When we have large snow piles it is very tough to see anyone. I have sent emails to the past 3 administrations in Portsmouth and have never received a response. I have spoken to Public Works, they explained that the signals are costly. A life is costly and so is a lawsuit. When the City had the road dug up and replaced the overhead wires to underground wiring that to me would have been the most opportune time to install signals. I've noticed a few new solar signals on Middle Street. They work great. The City needs something to illuminate and blink to allow pedestrians to cross without fear. Many residents cross from Feaster apartments. Many elderly cross to enjoy the Music Hall. Families with children and strollers wait for just the right time to cross. I believe this is an accident waiting to happen. Please install a crosswalk signal on State Street. I know that State Street is considered part of Route 1A and Route 1. Does the City need permission from NHDOT? Thank you all so very much for your time. Have a nice day! Bob Lenahan
